Educational Structure in Japan



It is compulsory for children to attend primary/elementary or junior high/middle schools in Japan, according to their age. After this period is over, there are various options for students to continue their education or other pathways that they can follow.

Are all high school courses 3 years long?
 ⇒ The period of study for a full-time course is normally 3 years. Please see Page 5 and 6 for other types of courses.

Types of High Schools



There are four types of high schools in Japan.

■ **Public High Schools (including National High Schools):**

- Funded by national, prefectural, or municipal government
- Mixed-sex education

■ **Private High Schools:**

- Founded by individuals or corporations. In many cases, school expenses are higher than those of public ones. ※
- Some private high schools offer gender-separated education, i.e., high schools only for boys or girls. Of course, there are also mixed-sex private schools.

※ There is a system to assist with private high school tuition fees according to individual household income. ⇒ Please see Page 9.



Are entrance examinations of public high school and private high school the same?

⇒ No. Entrance criteria and procedures differ between public and private high schools.

■ **Subjects covered in public high school entrance examinations**

■ **Private high school entrance examinations**

Schedules, contents, and admission criteria are different depending on the school.

For further information, talk to the teacher in charge of entrance examinations guidance at your junior high school.

In Osaka, there are four types of high school. They each have different periods of time at school, course lengths, and types of classes.

<Full-Time High Schools>

■ Period of time at school

From morning till evening (generally 8:30 a.m. to 5:00 p.m.)

■ Course length 3 years

■ Types of Classes

In many schools providing classes during daytime, students have to take a fixed number of classes each school-year. Advancement to the next year level requires obtaining the designated number of credits and completion of these classes. In schools with modular credit systems, students can choose their own classes.

■ Example of Full-Time High Schools

[High Schools with a General Studies Course]

All students take common subjects such as Japanese and mathematics.

[High Schools with Specialized Courses]

Students obtain basic knowledge in specialized fields such as industry, commerce, agriculture, or cross-cultural studies. In addition, they acquire skills or enhance their ability to obtain certifications.

[High Schools with an Integrated Studies Course]

In addition to common subjects, many optional subjects are offered. Students select them according to their interests.

[Empowerment Schools]

Students can revise the basics according to their level and deepen their ability to think critically on matters where there is no one correct answer.

[Step School]

Schools with meticulous support systems with about 30 students per class. In addition to common subjects, classes are conducted using experiential learning that makes best use of the unique characteristics of the school's local region.

<High Schools with Multiple-Class Credit Systems (“Creative Schools”)>

■ Period of time at school

1st session = in the morning (generally 8:30 a.m. to 12:30 p.m.)

2nd session = in the afternoon (generally 1:00 p.m. to 5:00 p.m.)

■ Course length

If a student attends 1st & 2nd sessions = 3+ years

If a student attends 1st & 2nd sessions separately = 4+ years

■ Types of Classes

Students can choose subjects and class hours to match their lifestyle or learning pace. Classes are available in the 1st or 2nd sessions. Class lengths can vary from full-year to half-year.

<High Schools Offering Daytime and Evening Credit Systems>

■ Period of time at school

Students choose their desired periods from 1st to 10th (from 10:50 a.m. to 9:05 p.m.).

For example,

Mostly daytime classes from about 10:50 a.m. to 4:30 p.m.

Mostly evening classes from about 5:35 to 9:05 p.m.

■ Course length

3 years, if mostly daytime classes. 4 years, if mostly evening classes.

3 years, if combined with some day-course subjects.

■ Types of Classes

Students can choose class hours to match their life-style and learning pace.

The class schedule for 1st year students is fixed and they study mainly mandatory subjects for graduation.

<High Schools Offering Evening Part-Time Courses>

■ Period of time at school

Many schools have classes from 6:00 p.m. to around 9:00 p.m.

■ Course length

4 years

3 years or longer if taken in combination with a correspondence course

■ Types of Classes

Classes are taken in the evening. Credits are given for each class.

<High Schools Offering Correspondence Courses>

■ Period of time at school

Class attendance requirements are different from school to school but are generally 2-3 days per week. The days and frequency of attending classes are different depending on the school.

■ Course length

3 year or more

■ Types of Classes

On days without class, students learn through self-study of notes and textbooks at home and receive guidance after submission of reports.



What are credits?

⇒ The word “credit” is used to indicate the length of time spent studying a particular course at high school. When the required learning outcomes have been achieved, a “credit” is awarded for the subject.

One credit consists of 35 lesson time units, where one unit is 50 minutes.

(50 minutes × 35 unit-time lessons = 1750 minutes)

Students graduate after completing a certain number of courses and obtaining the necessary number of credits.

A Typical Day at High School



The following are examples of everyday student activities at a full-time high school.

■ Morning

School generally begins at 8:30 a.m., and there are four lessons in the morning. Each lesson is taught by a different teacher.

■ Lunch

School lunch is not provided. Students may bring a box lunch from home or eat at the school cafeteria if there is one.

■ Afternoon

There are 2 or 3 lessons in the afternoon.

■ After School

For those who are interested, there are sports or cultural club activities to participate in. Participation is voluntary.



What kind of clothes should be worn to school?

⇒ School uniforms are called “Seifuku” or “Hyojun-fuku” in public secondary schools of Osaka Prefecture, and there are summer and winter versions.

Most high schools require students to wear a particular school uniform, however, some schools have no uniform requirement, and students can dress freely.

A Typical Year at High School



The following is a typical school-year at a full-time high school that has a three-term school-year. There are also schools with three-term school-years (the starting date for the second term differs depending on the school).

The Japanese school-year begins in April and finishes in March the following year.

■ 1st term (usually April to July)

■ Spring Vacation (late March to early April)

School Fees



School fees are required to study at school. Tuition fees vary depending on the type of school and course, i.e., private or public, part-time evening classes, correspondence courses, etc.

■ Required school fees and related expenses

- ① Examination fee = fee to take the entrance examination
- ② Admission fee = enrollment fee
- ③ Tuition fees = class fee
- ④ The cost for the first school year is the sum of fees in Categories ①, ②, and ③, plus textbook fees. In addition, school uniform fees must be paid to schools requiring them.

※1 Private high schools set their own tuition fees. This is only one example.

■ Financial assistance for tuition fees

○ Tuition fees at public high schools are free (※2) (except for some sundry fees) for households whose annual income is less than approximately 9.1 million yen.

※2 For those with an income over 9.1 million yen, students currently in the third year of junior high school will receive free tuition starting from their second year of high school.

○ Free tuition system for private high schools

Students currently in the third year of junior high school will receive free tuition starting from their second year of high school.

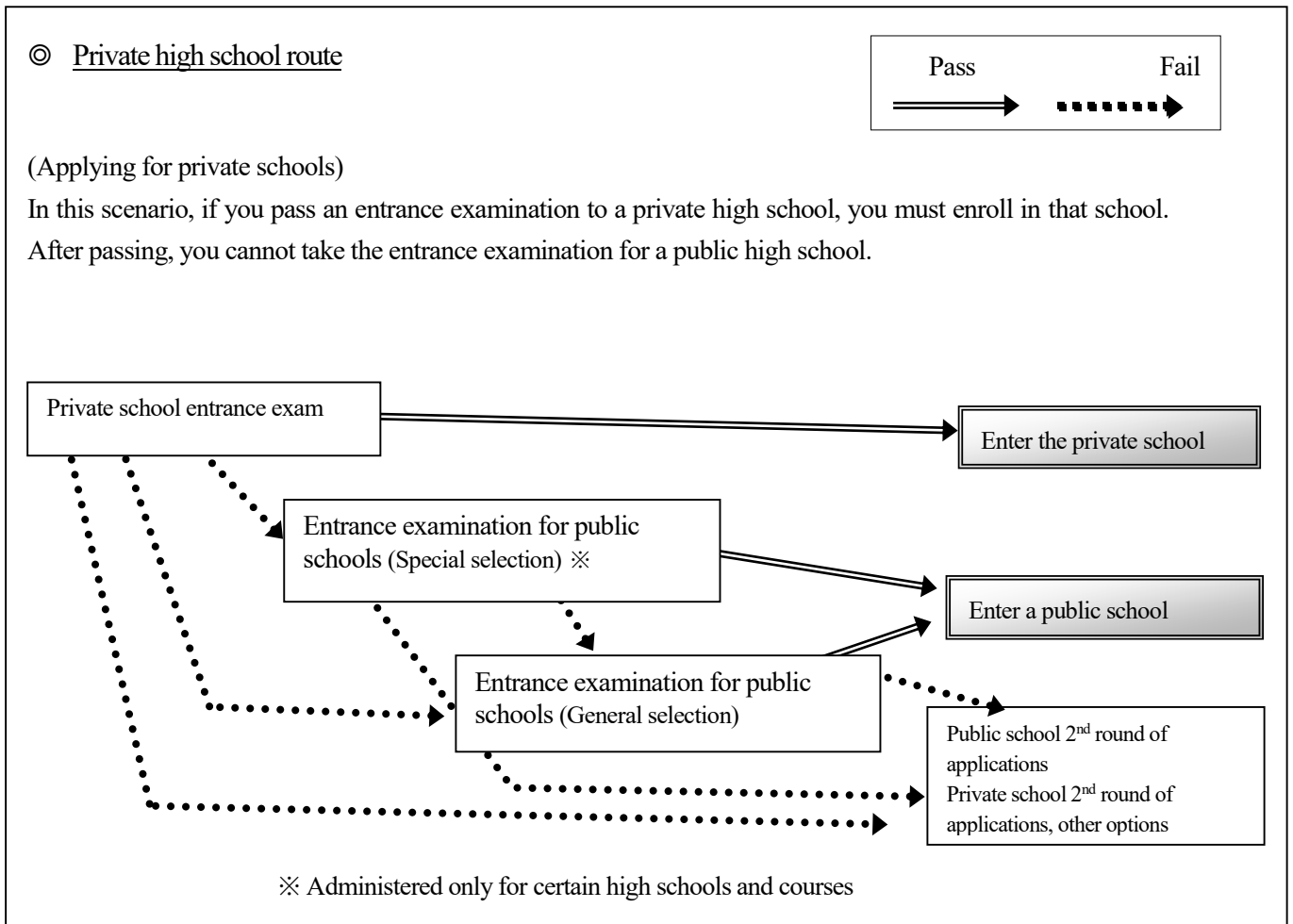

Entrance Examinations “Nyugaku Shiken”



An entrance examination must be taken to enter high school. The entrance examination is also called “Nyushi,” “Nyugakusha Sembatsu,” or “Sembatsu.” The following is an explanation of high school admission screening procedures.

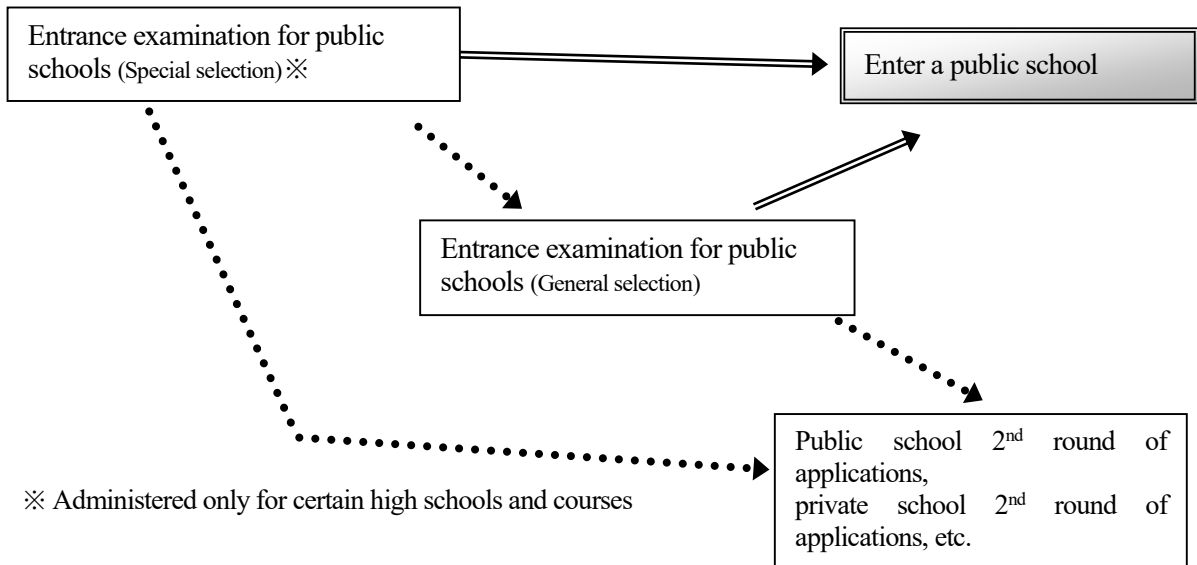
■ Stages from Entrance Exam to Entering a School



© Public high school route

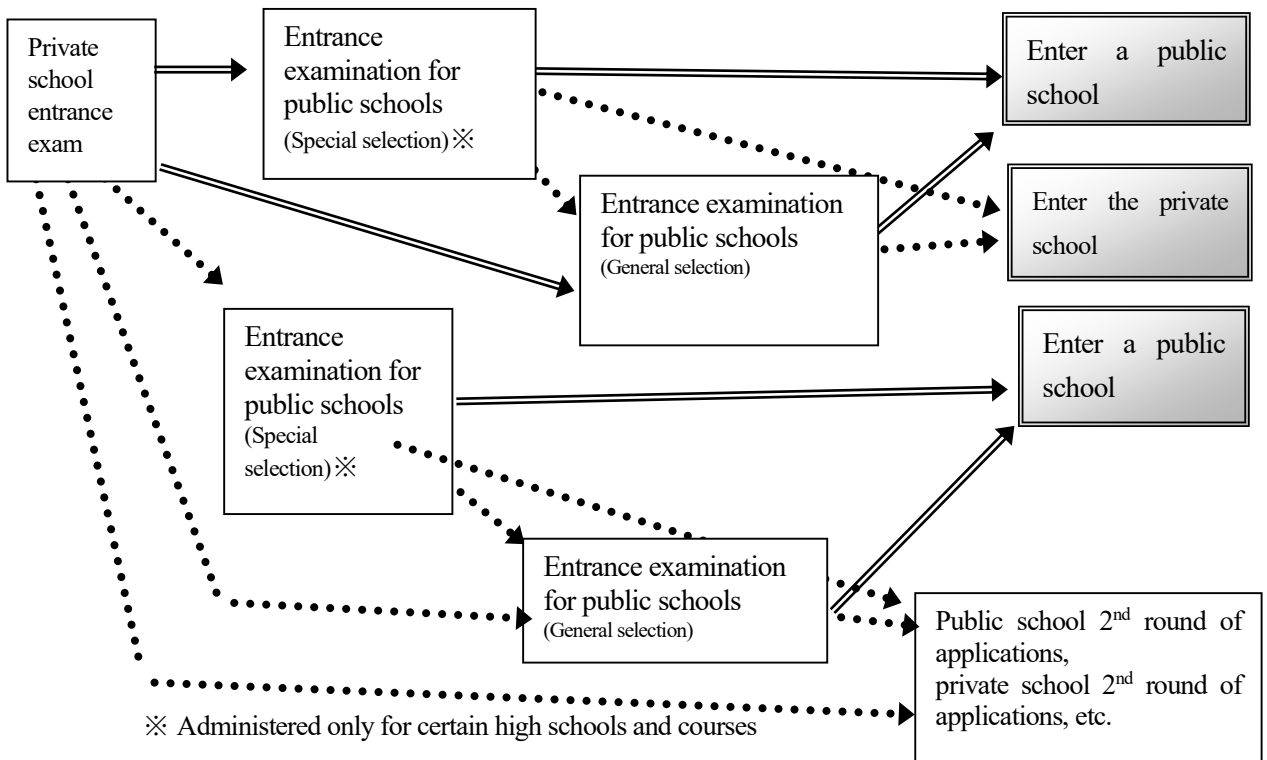
(Applying to a public school)

In this scenario, you choose to enter a public high school without taking an entrance exam at any private high schools.



(Applying for both public and private high schools)

Students who wish to enter a public high school can also take an entrance examination for a private high school if the private high school permits multiple applications. In this situation, the student can take the entrance examination for public high school even if they have passed the examination for the private high school. They can then choose to enter the public high school if they pass.



Public High School: Subjects Covered in Entrance Examinations



Subjects covered in entrance examinations differ depending on the course to be taken. The following is an introduction to subjects for which academic tests are performed and those for which other methods are used.

To take entrance examinations with special accommodations, supplementary qualifications are needed in addition to the normal requirements. Before submitting an application, please request your junior high school to contact the relevant municipality’s board of education for verification of the specific requirements.

Besides the general requirements, no extra qualifications are required to take the entrance examination for the Nose Branch of Osaka Prefectural Toyonaka High School.

Public High School:

Admission Criteria



You should confirm the criteria for passing the admission examination and prepare accordingly.

Successful candidates will be determined based on the results of the entrance examination(s), including the academic proficiency test, the content of their transcript, self-assessment report and the interview(s).

■ Transcript “Chosasho”

A transcript refers to a written report prepared by a teacher at the junior high school to which the student belongs or belonged. This document is sent to high schools the applicant wishes to enter. It includes academic results (called “hyotei”) in nine subjects (Japanese, social studies, mathematics, science, English, music, fine arts, physical education and health studies, and manual arts and home economics) and records of activities and behaviors regarding the student (e.g., contribution to the student council, the school committee, or a club and records of usual behaviors of the student in the school). The academic results in this document are rated with numbers between 1 (lowest) and 5 (highest).

■ Self-assessment report “Jiko-shinkokusho”

A self-assessment report is submitted along with the application form and is a document in which the applicant writes a summary of his or her prior study and ambitions and vision for high school life according to a predetermined theme given by the high school the applicant wishes to enter.

(Entrance examinations for foreign students and for returnee students who require Japanese Language Assistance do not require a self-assessment report.)

■ Interview “Mensetsu”

In an interview, examiners from a high school will question the applicant based on the content of his or her self-assessment report.

Please refer to Pages 12 and 13 to confirm which courses etc., require an interview.



In principle, high schools determine which candidates will be accepted by examining the applicant’s academic performance, the content of their self-assessment report, and how much they fit with the school’s own Admission Policy (expected skills and character of their students). Please read the Admission Policy of the school(s) you wish to enter carefully while you prepare your self-assessment report.

Public High School: Entrance Examinations for Returnee Students



Special examinations are available for Japanese returnee students and for foreign students, and Japanese returnee students requiring Japanese language assistance when they take entrance examinations for public high schools.

Entrance examination for returnee students

■ Target Group

Candidates who lived abroad for 2 consecutive years or longer and have been living in Japan for 2 years or less.

■ Names of courses

English Course, Intercultural Studies Course, Global Studies Course, Global Exploration Course, and Integrated Science Course

■ Contents

- Subjects covered in this examination are mathematics and English plus an interview. (The interview will be done in Japanese.)
- Each candidate is allowed to bring one bilingual dictionary (Japanese and a language other than English) of their choice for the mathematics and English test. However, for the English test, the candidate cannot use an English/Japanese translation dictionary or a dictionary written in English.

Public High School:

Entrance examination for foreign students and for returnee students who require Japanese Language assistance

Entrance examination for foreign students and for returnee students who require Japanese language assistance

■ Target Group

In principle, returnees from China, etc. or foreign nationals who have been admitted to the 4th grade or higher of primary school.

■ Schools conducting the examination during the 2025 School Year

■ Contents

- The subjects of examination are composition, mathematics and English (listening test included).
- The composition can be written in languages other than Japanese.
- *Furigana* (which phonetically describes how to read kanji characters) may be printed alongside the kanji in the entrance examination.
- For essay tasks, keywords that will help in understanding the question will be given in foreign languages.
- The candidate may use up to two dictionaries when taking the examination. However, for the English test, the candidate cannot use an English/Japanese translation dictionary or a dictionary written in English.
- ※ Does not require a self-assessment report.
- ※ Confirmation for the applicants that can take this examination is given by the Osaka Prefectural Agency of Education in November. Submission of documents, such as your arrival and departure history, are required for the confirmation. It can take time to prepare so prospective applicants should consult with teachers at their middle school as early as possible.

If you wish to take the entrance examinations covered on P15 and 16, the middle school you presently attend will make the arrangements. Please consult with your homeroom teacher to arrange this.

Public High School:
Special Accommodations in the Entrance Examination for
Returnee Students and Other Students Who Require
Japanese Language Assistance



Special Accommodations can be given to Japanese returnee students and foreign students requiring Japanese language assistance when they take entrance examinations for public high schools. Please check with your homeroom teacher whether you can apply for them.

Accommodation ①

■ **Target Group**

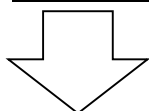
In principle, those who have entered or been transferred to a primary or middle school after returning to or entering Japan.

■ **Which High Schools**

All public high schools

■ **Contents**

A: An extension of examination time (approximately 130%)



Candidates who receive Accommodation A can also apply for B, C, and D as detailed below.

B: Dictionaries are allowed to be used during the examination.

Candidates can bring up to two dictionaries with them to the exam. However, for the English test, the candidate cannot use an English/Japanese translation dictionary or a dictionary written in English. Furthermore, electronic dictionaries are prohibited. The kanji literacy test is omitted for applicants requiring dictionaries.

C: In the academic aptitude test, *furigana* may be printed alongside kanji characters at the candidate's request.

However, for the Japanese language test, *furigana* will be omitted from the questions asking what the reading of the kanji characters are.

D: When there are essay or composition style questions in the Japanese language test, keywords for understanding the questions will also be provided in a language other than Japanese.

Accommodation ②

■ Target Group

Candidates who lived abroad for 2 consecutive years or longer and then have been living in Japan for 2 years or less.

■ Which High Schools

All public high schools

■ Contents

Your self-assessment report may be written by your teacher or your guardians for you. If it cannot be written by them and you write it by yourself, languages other than Japanese can be used.

If you wish to receive these accommodations, the middle school you presently attend can make the arrangements with the Osaka Prefectural Agency of Education. If you need them to do so, please consult with your homeroom teacher.

(*) The details of the special accommodations may be subject to change. They will be officially finalized between July and August 2024.
